THE heavy rain and the gale-force winds lashing the district on Wednesday triggered a landslip on the Mannarkad-Attappadi Ghat Road, resulting in mud, rubble and uprooted trees blocking free movement of traffic at several places along the stretch.

At the 10th curve of the Ghat Road, a tree came down resulting in mud and rubble being strewn all over. With the movement of traffic blocked, a long line of vehicles, including buses and cars, were seen waiting for the debris to be cleared. PWD officer Sreelekha said the Fire Force and po-

lice personnel are working to clear the debris and restore traffic at the earliest. The PWD has already in-

formed there will be traffic curbs in force along the stretch from Wednesday 6 pm- 8 am on Thursday to ensure hassle-free operations to clear the debris.
